## CELEBRATING A YEAR OF PROGRESS

In collaboration with Mercy Health, who has provided a \$2 million challenge grant to CMMB, we have established our **CHAMPS (CHildren And Mothers PartnershipS)** program in Côtés-de-Fer, Haiti with a goal of improving the health and wellbeing of women and children and their communities. Friends and supporters of CMMB responded generously to the challenge, providing \$1.2 million to date to build the Bishop Joseph M. Sullivan Center for Health and implement the Mother & Child Nutrition Initiative.

### Key Accomplishments

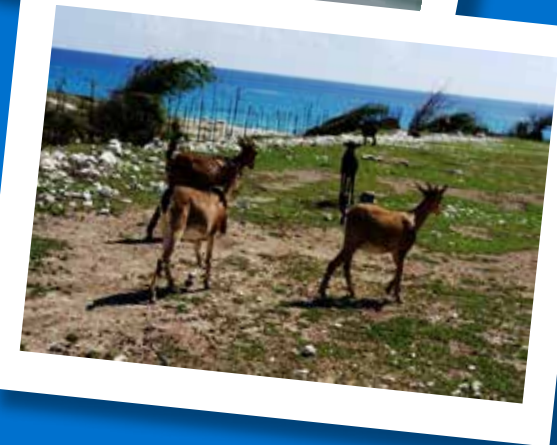
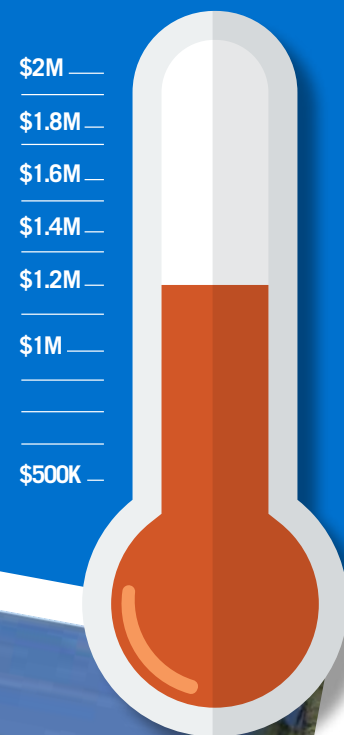
- Acquired 14 acres of land to build the Center
- Completed architectural and engineering plans and secured approval from Ministry of Health
- Conducted a water feasibility study, built wells and prepared site for construction
- Planned groundbreaking for January 2015

## MOTHER & CHILD NUTRITION INITIATIVE

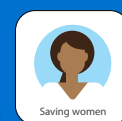
The program targets key causes of malnutrition and anemia through integrated nutrition interventions that include:

- Home-based gardening kits for families to grow locally sustainable fruits and vegetables
- An animal husbandry program that provides families with a pair of goats to improve short-term food security and long-term income generation
- A mother's network to educate and share information about nutrition and ways to develop a sustainable food supply for their families

The initiative began enrolling pregnant mothers and families with children under five years of age into the program with a goal of reaching 300 families.

# SNAP- SHOTS FROM THE FIELD



## SOUTH SUDAN

Our Safe Motherhood Program in South Sudan, a country with some of the worst maternal mortality and stillbirth rates in the world, is improving care for pregnant women through traditional birth attendants trained and equipped to monitor their health and encourage facility based deliveries.

The program recorded 1,093 successful deliveries with **no maternal deaths**.

In total 5,148 mothers and children benefitted from the program.



## HAITI

CMMB is a leading provider of HIV prevention, care and treatment support services in Haiti. SIDALE, which in Creole means “AIDS, Go Away,” is our flagship program with services provided in 6 hospitals throughout Haiti. Last year 80,065 people received care and treatment through SIDALE, including 11,627 pregnant women.



## ZAMBIA

In 2014, CMMB partnered with the Zambian Ministry of Community Development and Mother and Child Health to implement research-based recommendations to help address the problem of vast numbers of orphans in Zambia (1.3 million in 2014.) The research focused on key interventions at the community and household levels to protect and nurture children within families and communities.



## PERU

The 1,000 days between the beginning of a woman's pregnancy and her child's second birthday is a critical period to establish a healthy future for a child. Taking Care In the First 1000 Days, a partnership between CMMB, the Bon Secours Sisters and the Bon Secours Health System, utilizes community health workers to monitor the health of participants and ensure that mothers and infants have access to adequate nutrition, stimulation, health services and safe home environments to enable the children to grow and progress.



## KENYA

In Kenya, CMMB is partnering with local faith-based organizations to provide prevention, treatment, care and support services. CMMB supported Community Health Workers, operating in 5 districts of the Nyanza Province with the highest HIV prevalence, educate and mobilize at risk members of their communities to access available health services. 21,442 people utilized health services thanks to these outreach efforts.
