Living with a disability or raising a child with one can be isolating, especially where care is limited and discrimination persists. In Peru, 100% of families in our Rehabilitation with Hope project now have a trusted community to engage with and a safe space at home for physical therapy. UNITED STATES

The 2025 United Nations General Assembly brought noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) and mental health to the forefront of global health priorities. CMMB took a leading role in gatherings where leaders and advocates shared successes, highlighted challenges, and recommended measures to strengthen the world’s response to the growing NCD crisis—the impact of which falls most heavily on low- and middle-income countries.

KENYA

Although malaria is preventable, it remains a leading cause of death in Africa. In partnership with the Global Fund, CMMB Kenya increased testing of people with suspected cases from 77% to 98% in FY 2025. That means more people with access to treatment before it’s too late. The team also increased coverage of the three-dose malaria prevention medicine among pregnant women from 44% to 53%, preventing life-threatening complications for both mothers and their babies.

ZAMBIA

Childbirth should not be made more grueling by the need to travel impossibly long distances to the hospital, often in the back of an oxcart during labor. In Zambia’s Mwandi District, Access to Health Zambia, a member of CMMB’s global community, worked with the local government to open two new mothers’ shelters. Built next to health facilities, these shelters give pregnant women a safe and comfortable place to await delivery.

SOUTH SUDAN

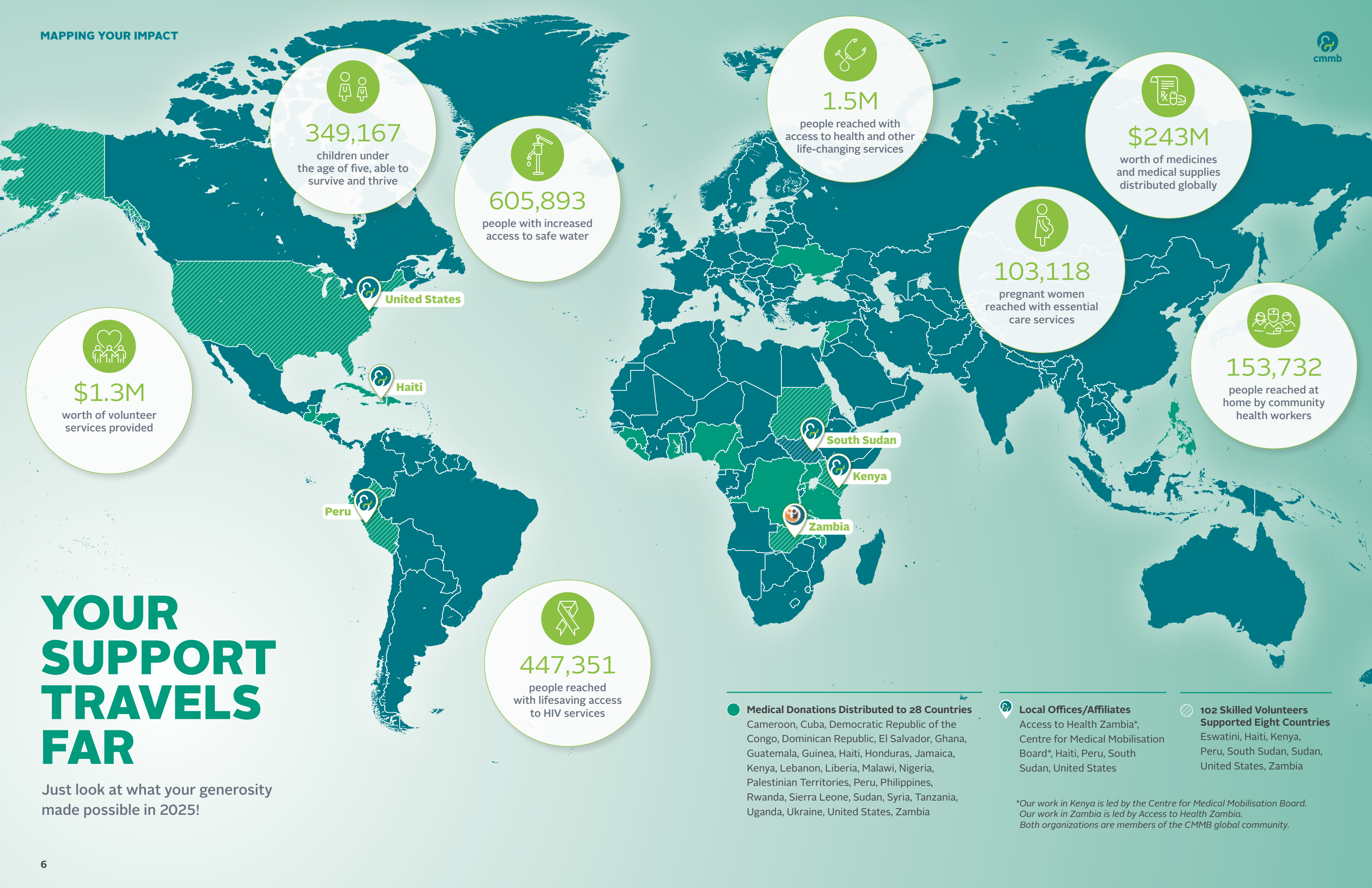
In South Sudan, the healthcare system is fragile. As a result, disease outbreaks like the growing cholera emergency are even more deadly. Amid these conditions, CMMB distributed over 2 million P&G Purifier of Water sachets and backed the Ministry of Health cholera vaccination campaign. In response to the compounding displacement and hunger crises, our team supported two mobile health clinics. At the Renk County Hospital, malnourished children slept four to a single bed. CMMB provided more bedding, so children could better heal.

Women in Haiti are supporting their families through CMMB’s livelihood initiatives, which organize community savings groups that offer small loans and financial literacy sessions. In one group, every loan was repaid, and the monthly income of 87% of members rose. Now families can plan their futures with confidence and hope.

LOCAL CARE FOR CHRONIC CONDITIONS

Health systems and communities worldwide are straining to meet the growing burden of chronic conditions like diabetes and hypertension. Today, noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) are the leading cause of death globally. But many of these premature deaths are preventable.

With CMMB support, Clinical Officer Eliud has the resources to help Kandy manage her hypertension at the Miambani Health Centre, Kenya.

Guided by our belief that all people deserve to live in communities that foster their health and well-being, CMMB’s **Access to Medicines Program** delivers medication and supplies to hard-to-reach places. For a century, this work has been core to our faith-driven mission.

In response to the NCD crisis, we are expanding our focus in **Kenya** by piloting the new **Noncommunicable Disease Impact Initiative (NCDI)**. Our vision is to work with governments to make reliable, affordable access to medication for diabetes and hypertension a permanent reality at local health facilities—preventing treatment interruptions that cause needless suffering.

In 10 of Kenya’s 47 counties, we trained 180 healthcare workers on treatment guidelines to give them the knowledge they need to deliver healing care. We also introduced data-driven forecasting tools to streamline work at health facilities that once relied on handwritten notes to track prescriptions and plan for medication orders.

With your support, change is happening. In a rural village in Kitui County, eastern Kenya, Miambani Health Centre had long struggled to keep essential medications in stock. Eliud, a clinician, often had no choice but to send his patients home with dangerously high blood pressure or blood sugar levels. “I felt uncomfortable, like I hadn’t offered the service they deserved,” he shared.

Eliud now guides his patients to a healthier future. Miambani Health Centre has medications, quality diagnostic practices, and reporting tools—even a weekly clinic just for people with NCDs. “I feel very good,” Eliud said. “When I prescribe, patients get the medication and commit to follow-ups.”

Because of you, healthcare workers like Eliud feel supported, and more people with NCDs can get care and medication, paving the way for healthier futures. CMMB will continue to champion care closer to home.

FAITH IN THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS

Our Catholic faith calls us to walk with vulnerable communities toward a healthier future. CMMB’s **Access to Medicines Program** carries our impact beyond the countries where we have staff on the ground. In FY 2025, we distributed over \$243 million in medicines and supplies to 28 countries.

Strong partnerships make this possible. CMMB works closely with **Cross Catholic Outreach (CCO)**, a ministry that serves the global poor. Together, united in faith and calling, we have delivered over 8 million packages of medicine and medical supplies since 2017 to local health clinics and hospitals in nine countries, free of charge.

“No single organization can carry the weight of health equity alone,” said Edith Stewart, corporate relations manager at CCO. “For us, our partnership with CMMB is nothing

short of a lifeline, the very heartbeat of the free medicines we are blessed to distribute to our brothers and sisters in greatest need. We are profoundly grateful for this shared mission of mercy.”

Today, in the communities we reach together, more people with chronic conditions like hypertension, cancer, and heart disease have better access to affordable medication—and the chance to lead healthier lives.

Luis, a 50-year-old father of two young children in El Progreso, Honduras,

worked as a bus driver, safely ferrying students to school, until he received a devastating diagnosis: prostate cancer. Without health insurance, his family struggled to afford his medication. His sister stepped in to pay for his care, but the cost quickly exhausted her resources. “I tried to help Luis so he wouldn’t feel overwhelmed by financial stress, but this medicine is expensive,” she shared.

Unable to access treatment, Luis’s health deteriorated. But his sister never gave up. She tirelessly searched for assistance. Through CCO’s local

partner, Luis received a supply of Docetaxel, a chemotherapy medication donated by CMMB. Now, Luis has support in his cancer journey. His family feels relieved knowing their loved one finally has the care he deserves.

By partnering with CCO, we reach more of our neighbors in need like Luis. We’re grateful to CCO and its continued collaboration as we work to spread hope to underserved places.

INVESTING IN MENTAL HEALTH

Strong mental health is essential to overall well-being. Yet mental health conditions are often misunderstood, stigmatized, or overlooked.

CMMB's maternal health work in Trujillo and Huancayo prioritizes mental health and well-being for pregnant women like Jimena. Peru.

CMMB delivers healthcare solutions that nurture the whole person. We connect communities with mental wellness services and medication, knowing that the right help can uplift entire families.

In **Peru**, we help women manage the anxiety and depression that can accompany the journey to motherhood. Left alone with their fears, new mothers may struggle to bond with and care for their babies.

CMMB-supported community health workers help ease the transition. During in-home visits, they share information and advice with pregnant women and their families. They also organize support groups and link women who need extra care to CMMB psychologists.

Your generosity made a difference for Jimena, 30, of Trujillo. Halfway through her pregnancy, Jimena felt anxious. A community health worker connected her to counseling, where she learned to express her emotions, manage her thoughts, and use breathing techniques to calm herself. Gradually, her self-confidence grew.

"I learned that I am strong, that I am a good mother, that I am not alone, and that asking for help is also a way to take care of my baby," Jimena told us.

In **Zambia**, when hard times reach a breaking point, struggling parents sometimes send a child to a childcare facility to live. The decision is agonizing. With the **GHR Foundation**, we advocate for families to stay together—then share resources to make this possible.

As we work to reunite families in crisis, we provide mental health training for social workers and caregivers and build strong communities of support. Through positive parenting classes, income-generating activities, and peer mentorship groups, we help improve families' quality of life.

Also in Zambia, we are beginning to integrate mental health into our work in Kanyama, a new site for CMMB's maternal and child health program, **Children and Mothers Partnerships (CHAMPS)**. By training health workers on mental health screening and referrals and conducting outreach campaigns, we will bring much-needed encouragement to mothers—building stronger, healthier families.

ADVANCING CARE FOR CANCER

Cancer is easier to treat when detected early. But when access to screening and treatment is out of reach, outcomes suffer. With your help, CMMB is advancing cancer care—and creating hope for survival.

In **Zambia**, we work to protect more women and girls from cervical cancer, the most common cancer diagnosis. We promote HPV vaccination, which can prevent nearly all cases, and provide regular screening to catch cancer early. As our community outreach builds demand, we are training more healthcare workers to diagnose and provide lifesaving treatment.

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths globally, yet Zambia’s testing and treatment capabilities are limited. Together with the **Bristol Myers Squibb Foundation (BMSF)** and the Ministry of Health, we are

strengthening the health system’s lung cancer response.

We introduced lung cancer screenings in Makululu, a large, rural village where many are exposed to dangerous mining fumes and other contaminants. Through door-to-door campaigns and health talks, we spread essential knowledge about lung cancer. We are also training healthcare workers and specialists to connect more people to care.

In **Kenya**, CMMB’s cancer care program brings screening and preventative services to women in Kitui County, where breast and cervical cancer

account for half of all cancer diagnoses. Our commitment has ignited a lasting impact. Today, more girls and women know the importance of HPV vaccination and regular screening. Cancer patients receive treatment close to home, at a cancer center built by CMMB with BMSF and the Ministry of Health. Now struggling families have places to turn to for comfort.

CMMB’s cancer support groups have evolved into an independent community organization. Its members help one another pay for medication, visit those too sick to travel, and encourage screening and

vaccination. Their example inspires other women, said Veronica, a cervical cancer survivor and the group’s leader.

“We feel strong to face this disease that was mostly known as a killer disease in our society,” Veronica said. “We are creating hope, since we are living acts of testimony.”

Building on our accomplishments, CMMB is launching a new project to expand cancer care services in Kenya. With your help, and because of incredible partners, we will continue expanding access to this life-sustaining support.

SERVING MOTHERS AND CHILDREN IN A NEW SETTING

Our faith calls us to care for the world’s most vulnerable women and children. Through our **Children and Mothers Partnerships (CHAMPS)** program, CMMB brings quality healthcare to underserved communities in Haiti, Kenya, Peru, South Sudan, and Zambia.

Our CHAMPS framework helps provide care and support at home and at local health facilities. We work with each community to shape solutions based on their distinct needs. In **Haiti** and **South Sudan**, CHAMPS and other projects address widespread poverty and malnutrition by supporting families to raise goats as a source of income and manage gardens to improve household diets. In **Peru**, we combat widespread anemia through nutrition support for pregnant women and children. In every CHAMPS program, CMMB-supported community health workers encourage regular health facility visits for prenatal care and in-facility births, helping to reduce high neonatal and maternal mortality rates.

Until now, CHAMPS has focused on hard-to-reach, rural areas. But mothers and children struggle to access basic healthcare in cities, too. In response, we started our first urban CHAMPS in a country we know well—Zambia.

In 2014, the first CHAMPS program in **Zambia** began in Western Province’s remote Mwandia District. Our new CHAMPS program is in Kanyama, a densely populated informal settlement of 180,000 in Zambia’s capital, Lusaka. Here, poverty and environmental challenges drive poor health.

CHAMPS Kanyama is igniting change with programs to promote healthier communities by advocating for health facility deliveries, better sanitation, childhood immunization, and nutritious diets. We trained healthcare workers at Kanyama Referral Hospital on lifesaving techniques like kangaroo mother care, which uses skin-to-skin contact to help newborns regulate their temperature and gain weight.

For a young mother named Memory, this practice saved a life. Her son, Daniel, was premature and weighed less than three pounds. Hospital staff encouraged Memory to snuggle Daniel against her skin. With consistent kangaroo mother care, his weight soon doubled, and a healthy mother and child went home. There, CMMB-supported community health workers continue to monitor Daniel’s progress as he grows stronger.

This is the impact your generosity makes possible. Together, we are reducing preventable deaths and inspiring hope in communities—wherever the need takes us.

BRINGING CARE CLOSE TO HOME

Healthcare that’s close to home is a universal need. When health services are distant, unreliable, or unaffordable, families go without. Far too often, the consequences are tragic and preventable.

Thanks to your belief in our mission, CMMB is strengthening systems of care rooted in and delivered by local communities. By bringing quality healthcare directly into communities, we are expanding health services in places long ignored.

In **South Sudan**, mothers and newborns die at higher rates than nearly anywhere else. Confronting this reality, CMMB equips local health facilities with lifesaving tools like ultrasound machines, surgical equipment, and neonatal incubators. As South Sudan faces overlapping crises, we are training healthcare workers to ensure mothers and babies can receive care when it matters most. Your generosity reached Atim, a

mother-to-be in Western Equatoria State. After she felt sharp pain low in her abdomen, her local health facility transferred her to CMMB-supported St. Theresa Mission Hospital in Nzara. There, she underwent an emergency cesarean section that wasn’t possible at her home facility.

Atim survived her pregnancy—and so did every pregnant woman cared for at a CMMB-supported health facility in South Sudan during FY 2025. “I’m so grateful for the support CMMB is providing to mothers and our babies,” shared Atim, whose tiny daughter received specialized treatment. “I know my child is going to be okay.” Atim’s daughter will continue receiving care from CMMB-supported community

health workers, who visit families at home for routine health checks.

In **Haiti**, community health workers meet families at rally posts—small gathering points close to home—to encourage on-time child vaccinations. Despite Haiti’s worsening gang violence,

our results are hopeful. In FY 2025, we fully immunized 95% of children under 12 months and 97% of children ages 12 to 23 months.

Angeline, a mother of two who recently moved to Côtes-de-Fer, relies on community-based care to protect her children from preventable disease. “I no longer have to walk far or take the bus that costs a lot of money that I don’t even have,” she said. “It is convenient to vaccinate my children at the rally post.”

When care is close by, women like Atim and Angeline can protect their children and plan their tomorrows. With your trust, CMMB is building local systems that will better the lives of women and children for years to come.

HIV PROGRESS IN THE TOUGHEST ENVIRONMENTS

We envision a future free of HIV. With the United Nations' 95-95-95 goals as our guidepost, we partner with governments to deliver care with dignity, helping more people who live with HIV know their status, access treatment, and achieve a suppressed viral load.

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Despite Haiti's worsening violence, our team met these standards across CMMB Haiti's network of sites.

With support from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), we work in two of the world's most challenging environments: South Sudan and Haiti. Our years of experience in HIV prevention, testing, and treatment have propelled progress. Gains toward the 95-95-95 goals in the areas where we work have been exceptional.

In South Sudan's Western and Central Equatoria states, frontline healthcare workers trained by CMMB provide HIV testing and care at 39 health facilities. We also bring these services to locations like churches and taxi stops, creating easy new pathways for support.

Helping HIV-positive pregnant women deliver a baby who is HIV free is central to the program. CMMB-supported healthcare workers provide HIV testing to all women who attend prenatal services. Women testing positive begin antiretroviral therapy immediately to prevent transmission.

With compassion, we embrace children and young people living with HIV, like 25-year-old Rita* from Mundri. She became a mother, then received devastating news—she and her baby had HIV.

CMMB's project delivered treatment, counseling, and education. "My life has transformed," Rita shared. "I have learned that HIV does not define me. It's just part of my story."

In Haiti, even with progress against HIV, children still face barriers to consistent care. By training community health workers to monitor and document where children take their medicine, we standardized a simple but impactful step that has helped reduce missed doses and protect futures.

Marie*, 39, receives HIV treatment at CMMB's Bishop Joseph M. Sullivan Hospital in Côtes-de-Fer. For the mother of three, care that's close to home "means everything." Regular tests since 2022 show that the virus is undetectable in Marie's blood—a sign that she consistently takes her medication and can look forward to a long, productive life. "Without this hospital, I don't know where I would be now; maybe I would already be dead," she said.

Thanks to you, Marie and her family have hope for the future, and CMMB has support to reach more families.

GLOBAL CONNECTIONS

Ever since CMMB founder Dr. Paluel Flagg completed his first mission trip to Haiti, volunteerism has been central to CMMB’s work. We have supported volunteer placements that are anchored in respect and demonstrate impact for more than a century. Today, volunteers serve in communities worldwide, while our institutional partnerships strengthen global connections and amplify the impact you make possible.

In rural areas of **Peru**, access to quality emergency obstetric care is not always available. To address this gap, CMMB partnered with **Providence Health**, a Catholic health system based in the United States.

Over four months, three specialist physicians from Providence Health dedicated more than 500 hours to developing and implementing an obstetric emergency training program. Over 50 healthcare workers in Huanayo and Trujillo completed the training through a mix of in-person and virtual sessions. The results point to progress. Participants gained knowledge and confidence, strengthening their ability to manage complicated deliveries. The program’s success has inspired plans to bring similar trainings to other locations.

Thank you, Providence Health, for lending your time, talent, and resources. You are helping us and the families we serve set every child on a path to lifelong health.

Madonna chose to leave an impact through a bequest in her will, but there are many other ways to shape your legacy. A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)—funded annuity allows you to support a charity during your lifetime while receiving a tax-free guaranteed income. A QCD offers you the joy of seeing your impact firsthand, lifetime financial benefits, and the knowledge that your generosity will live on for generations to come.

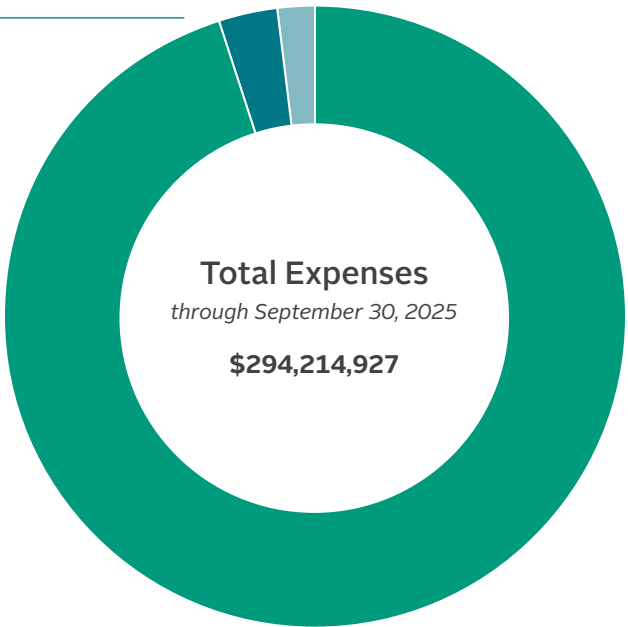
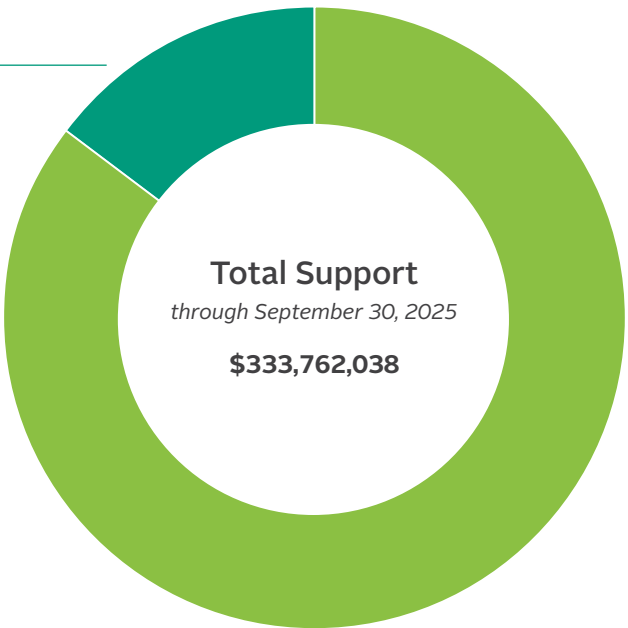

We are called to protect people and the planet we all share. We care for God's creation by strengthening health systems that help communities withstand climate pressures, disasters, and environmental challenges.



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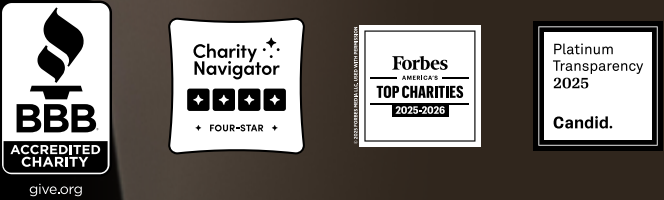
